Pro-Life Report

OUR BISHOPS CALL FOR "FORTNIGHT FOR RELIGIOUS FREEDOM," JUNE 21 - JULY 4

id you know that on Friday, March 23, some 55,000 of our fellow Catholics and friends from other faiths held protest rallies in 143 cities across the USA? They were rallying for religious liberty and against the notorious HHS mandate, which would *force* Catholic institutions and individuals (you and me!) to fund abortion drugs, contraceptives and sterilizations in violation of our consciences.

Most of the so-called news media failed to cover these unprecedented and obviously newsworthy events, such as the rally of 2,500 people right in front of HHS headquarters in downtown Washington, D.C. Hundreds of people turned out for the rally at the Roybal Federal Building in downtown L.A., too.

PGK Dan Engler took part in the freedom rally in Ventura, along with other Santa Barbarans. He reports that 290 pro-lifers (by count) attended the protest in front of the Ventura Government Center at the major intersection of Telegraph and South Victoria during the afternoon rush hour. Many of the protestors were students from St. Augustine Academy, an independent Catholic grade school-high school in Ventura, and from the thriving local homeschooling community.

Also attending the Ventura rally were two Catholic priests in their clericals, two Catholic sisters in their habits, a minister, parents and other concerned citizens.

Response from the thousands of passing drivers during the 90-minute protest was enthusiastic, with constant thumbs-ups and honks of approval. The students were clearly there of their own free will, as their creative, handmade picket signs showed. Typical slogans included, "Life & Liberty," "We Will Not Comply" and "Don't Tread on Catholics." Grownups' slogans included, "We Are All Catholics Now," "Stop Obama's Mandate" and "Defend Religious Liberty."

The HHS mandate is an even worse form of persecution than killing us, because if we die for the Faith we'll go to Heaven, but if we comply with the mandate and take babies' lives, we'll go to Hell.

The stakes are clearly high in this battle; many believe the ultimate purpose of the HHS *diktat* is a government takeover of America's 600 Catholic hospitals. Our bishops know they can't back down and are speaking out continually against the mandate. On April 12, they issued a document, "Our First, Most Cherished Liberty," that promised continued resistance. They urge all Catholics and all other Americans to join them in the fight.

The bishops have set aside "A Fortnight for Freedom" for June 21-July 4 – from the feast day of the martyrs St. Thomas More and St. John Fisher to Independence Day – for prayer and protest, for Catholics to muster all our energy in defense of religious liberty. Please watch for news of the bishops' plans for those two weeks. Our Council will keep you posted about events in Southern California. We Knights must be in the front ranks of this battle.

"GO FORTH AND ANNOUNCE THE GOOD NEWS OF THE LORD"

In the Catholic Church, we continue to celebrate Easter for Seven Sundays, coming to a close at Pentecost Sunday, some 50 days after the resurrection.

Throughout the Easter season we celebrate the Sacraments of young children's first Holy Communion, the Confirmation of teens and adults, and the baptism of all those seeking the truth of Christ as their savior.

For those of us who able to endure the Easter Vigil, we are often times rewarded with the gratification of welcoming new members to the Church, and renewing our own Baptismal promises in their midst.

But what do we do after Easter? Do we continue to be the welcoming Church or Parish that was promised to these newly initiated and their families?

If we are to expect our Church to survive for another 2000 years I hope we continue to welcome our newest members and create a welcoming environment for them.

I'm sure most all of us, just by the nature of our strong faith as Knights, are involved or have been involved in several ministries and can be easily distracted before and after mass; cleaning and putting things away, rushing off to speak with the Pastor, or simply heading to the car to beat the parking lot traffic; but what of the newly initiated that we all sang alleluia with, just weeks ago?

In several if not many instances the young families of newly baptized, or confirmed kids have never felt terribly welcomed at the Church in the first place, and now that the excitement and focus of the Pastor's Easter homily has faded away, they may find themselves once again strangers in the Church, and choose not to return the next Sunday.

If nothing else, the focus of these *Men we call Knights*, should be to ensure all are made to feel welcomed at our churches and be able and welcome to participate fully in our faith.

With the new translation of the Mass, the Priest or Deacon has the option to dismiss the faithful with the words, "Go forth and announce the Good News of the Lord", and this is what all Christians should do; invite our neighbors, friends and strangers alike into the light of Christ.

As Catholics we are not always the most willing to go door to door sharing the Good News, but if we can simply turn to the people next to us in the pew, and offer an invitation to stay, literally within minutes we may have prevented never seeing a young Catholic family in Church again.

All of our work is fit so we are stretching our minds, and I can see the difference and how much I've learned by the end of the school year. We are encouraged to try our hardest and be the best we can be, and our teachers will always be ready to help us get there. I'm happy to go to school every day, and I know I'm getting the best education possible.

I have so many more opportunities to try new things going to school at Mount Carmel, and I'm really glad I get a chance to try everything. One of the biggest things throughout my time as a middle-schooler was being on the Student Council. It's taught me so many things, like leadership and teamwork. I've been a member of the Student Council for two years, and I've learned so much in that amount of time. I understand what being a leader means, and how to take charge, and it's has helped me in all of my other classes too. Another opportunity we get is our elective classes. In music I learned so much more about rhythm and tempo, and how to perform all together as one giant group. I love being able to come to Mount Carmel every day. because I can just be me. I learn more and more about how to live out my faith, and I'm surrounded by people who understand me and where I come from. Every day I get to pray in the morning, at lunch, and before we leave school. I'm so glad I have the freedom to do this, because it helps me realize how much I appreciate praying with my classmates. I know I can ask them to pray for me and they will. A while ago my grandma fell and had to go to the hospital. She was in a wheel chair for a very long time and she didn't seem to be getting better. When she had to have surgery, I asked my class and my teachers to pray for her because she might never have been able to walk again. So we all prayed, day after day, and she started to make a recovery. Now she can walk, and I'm so grateful for my friends that helped me get through such a scary time in my life. Every day in Religion class, when we all talk about what we have, I realize how cared for I am and I'm so thankful for this. Coming to a Catholic school helps me realize I'm not alone in my faith, and I have so many people that will stand by me and help me be true to myself.

It's great coming to Mount Carmel every day where I can have great teachers and classmates that help me learn more and get a great education, have many opportunities for extra activities like Student Council and sports, and practice my Catholic faith openly and learn more about it. The day I enrolled as a student I joined a community that was closer than other schools, and I can never be thankful enough for the opportunities I was given here. I look forward to coming to school, because I know it will be a new day with exciting adventures in every class. My 7th grade class is a family, and no one can say that isn't true. Because I go to a Catholic school, I have a home outside of home. My Catholic education has changed my life and given me so much more than I ever could've wished for, and there isn't a day that goes by when I'm not thankful for everything God has blessed me with. I'm preparing for my future when I go to school, and coming to Mount Carmel helps me realize anything's possible.

Soon, thanks to my school, I will be able to receive the body and blood of Christ. Also, at church, the priest will talk to us about stories that teach us a lesson from God directed to us humans as a whole. The children in Catholic schools are blessed to be able to go to church with their friends and family.

At Notre Dame School, we have a real sense of family. All of the little children have older buddies. It's almost like having a little brother. The bigger kids watch out for each other. 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
MARIO F. BORGATELLO

Happy 94th Birthday on April 18th

Mario F. Borgatello was born on April 18, 1918 in Santa Barbara, California, the youngest of five children to Secondo Borgatello and Josephine Prato Borgatello. Six short months after Mario was born, Secondo passed away leaving Josephine to raise five young children on her own. Times were very tough and they did the best that they could to get by on a daily basis with much help from Santa Barbara County Social Services. As a way to feed the family, Josephine began providing boarding for the immigrants that would come from Italy as gardeners and stone masons.

In the late 1920's Mario and his older brother Charles started collecting food scraps to help feed the hogs that their mom was raising. Over the years this hauling business has evolved into what is now known as MarBorg Industries. In 1938 Mario met Marguerite Saulsburg, the love of his life. They were married in November of 1941 at St. Joan of Arc Church in Las Vegas. Mario and Marguerite (Peggy) were married for 70 years and had two sons, David and Mario Jr. Peggy died June 1, 2011. Since then the family has blossomed to seven grandchildren and 21 great-grandchildren. Grandchildren are Theresa Carlson, Anthony Borgatello, Brian Borgatello, Andrea Forey, Kathy Koeper, Kristine Throckmorton, and Kerri Boeddeker.
