CHANGE IN THE CHURCH

I hope we are all enjoying the new year and I'm certain none of us have broken any New Year's resolutions, to make us all better and new people.

It's often funny how we always want to change ourselves, but we don't want anything around us to change; although we complain about the local and national government and the traffic and the nightly news casts, we for the most part are pretty complacent people.


For Almost two years Pope Francis has been our Holy Father and we should offer our prayers often for him and his mission as Pope. I hear many people praise and yet many people seem skeptical at the same time of Francis's policies and ideas, as *new*, and too *radical*. Many people seem concerned that the Pope is ready to "change" the Catholic Church.

Let us not forget that there was time in the Church that the Diaconate was a new idea, long before the priesthood was in itself a new innovation, and celebrating the Eucharist in churches, rather than in peoples homes was a whole new idea. The papacy we know today developed over a long period of time, with many high and low points, before it became the current universal office of the Church. Individual confessions were an innovation of Irish monks and took centuries to be acceptable. Several of the religious orders we know today were established in the twelfth and thirteenth centuries, with university and indulgences following years later. At one point even celibacy for the clergy was a whole new idea.

In our own time we have seen since the second Vatican Council, and even more recently, communal penance and anointing services. The new Catechism has taken the place of the one based on the council of Trent, or as we may have known the Baltimore Catechism, and just 4 years ago we received the revised missal in our own English language.

Newness and change are integral in the Church's life. No doubt there are many new, wonderful and challenging things on the horizon for the Church's future. Even if some changes aren't initially embraced I hope we all have open minds and try to understand the changes and in time grow patient with change in the Church that is indeed Worldwide and affects several billion people, not just our own Parish Churches.

- The Clergy Appreciation Dinner will be held at Bishop Diego García High School on Wednesday, January 21 at 7 p.m. Country Catering will bring the food for the nourishment of our bodies while we celebrate those who nourish our spirits. Tickets are \$20 per person and the festivities begin at 7 p.m.

Under Communication, the Council received letters of gratitude from: the Poor Clare Sisters, Sister Margaret Keaveney of St. Vincent's, Kathleen Baushke of Transition House, Rick Keith of Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care, and Hannah Miller of Catholic Charities for our \$1000 donation during the Knights Nite Out. Also received was a letter of gratitude from Kelly at Villa Majella for the use of the hall and the fabulous barbeque that made their Fall Music Festival such a success.

Under Old Business, Financial Secretary Ray Charpentier made a brief presentation regarding the financial and social success of Knights Nite Out.

Under New Business, the Council donated \$300 to designate a wheel chair for a veteran through the American Wheelchair Foundation.

Under the District Deputy's Report, District Deputy Ray Centeno, Jr. spoke to the new members about following through on this auspicious beginning by attending Council meetings and events and to join the Knights insurance programs. He spoke to the rest of the Council about the Good Shepard Program to retain our membership and reminded the Council that every Sunday is a membership drive. Pro-Life Report



Stone Age People were Pro-Life and Loving — Unlike Many "educated" People Today

Did you hear about the discovery that scientists made recently in Alaska?

While excavating a Stone Age site on the Upward Sun River in Central Alaska, archaeologists found the graves of three children buried 11,500 years ago,

including a stillborn premature baby and a five-week-old baby buried side by side. Interred with the babies, both of whom appeared to be female, was a "relatively costly" trove of carved hunting spears and other implements. (*Los Angeles Times*, November 13, 2014)

So it seems that an Alaskan mom and dad who lived 115 centuries ago recognized the obvious: that their unborn baby was just as human and precious as a born baby. What's more, they loved her so much that they buried a hoard of valuable objects with her.

These facts tend to debunk the widely held view that prehistoric folks were ignorant and stupid, and that today's "educated" people are much wiser and smarter. Yet few of our thousands of grade schools, high schools, colleges and universities teach students that unborn babies are human beings with the same value as born babies. The anti-unborn-baby mindset infects many "Catholic" campuses as well.

We're spending billions on schools that turn out graduates who scorn unborn babies as "blobs of cells" or "fetuses" who are fit only for the garbage can or the incinerator. Never mind that "fetus" is Latin for "young one" or "little one." Never mind (in the case of Catholic schools) that Greek translations of the New Testament use the same word, *brephos*, for babies born and unborn, and that Latin translations use *infans* for both.

Our "civilization" is in a bad way when it's controlled by people who are more ignorant than cavemen.

On behalf of the students and staff of St. Therese Classical Academy, I thank you again for your spiritual and financial support. I would also like to offer a brief update on the goings-on at the academy, which also may be suitable for publication in the next newsletter.

We recently enrolled our twelfth student, which for any seminal Christian apostolate is a great number with which to start. Another recent addition is a highly qualified and experienced teacher who will be forming our classical choir and teaching our literature classes. Her name is Karen Schindler and how she got on our radar is an amazing story in itself where you don't have to look too hard to see the hand of God at work. Our student choir is looking forward to receiving an invitation from the Knights to perform. Besides our solid classroom curriculum - other recent activities have included attending a chamber orchestra, school tours of the Old Mission, Courthouse, and LA Cathedral (where a play on the life of St. Therese our patroness was performed). We've been enjoying many outdoor activities including horseback riding, participating in local civic celebrations on national holidays, and the State Street Guadalupe procession. One of the more amazing outings as part of our art curriculum was to the Getty museum to see Peter Paul Ruben's massive tapestries "The Triumph of the Eucharist" exhibit. Here our students had the opportunity to interpret authentic renaissance artwork and numerous Latin phrases such as "*Hoc est corpus meum..*"

On an outing to the Christian Service-4-Life rally (a pro-life event), we ran into the Superintendent of Catholic High Schools Monsignor Sal Pilato. 



Knights of Columbus Pledges \$1.4 Million for Special Olympics World Games in L.A.

The Knights of Columbus formally announced a donation to cover the costs of athletes from the United States and Canada during their time in Los Angeles as they participate in the 2015 Special Olympics World Games.

The Knights' \$1.4 million sponsorship will cover the costs of food, transportation and entertainment for every athlete from the two countries during their time in Los Angeles.

Supreme Knight Carl Anderson made the announcement during a news conference on July 14, 2014 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. Joining him at the announcement was World Games CEO and President Patrick McClenahan and Archbishop of Los Angeles José H. Gomez.

"The Knights of Columbus were there with Special Olympics and its founder, Eunice Kennedy Shriver, from the very beginning," said Supreme Knight Anderson. "Sargent Shriver, Eunice's husband, was a friend and a proud member of the Knights of Columbus, and like him, we are here today to continue those efforts on behalf of people with intellectual disabilities. Our support exemplifies our commitment to the dignity of every person, our dedication to assisting with our neighbors' needs whatever they may be, and our deep appreciation for the great work done by Special Olympics."

Anderson also announced that he is asking the leadership of the K of C in each U.S. state and Canadian province to increase the number of volunteer hours donated to Special Olympics this year.

In a 1986 letter, Eunice Kennedy Shriver reflected on the Knights' long involvement, observing, "When a great organization like the Knights of Columbus decides to support Special Olympics, I know that God is looking after his children."

Patrick McClenahan, president and CEO of Special Olympics World Games Los Angeles 2015, noted: "Anyone that is a part of the Special Olympics movement is deeply aware of the long and generous support by the Knights of Columbus, and today's pledge is another amazing milestone. We hope their donation inspires other organizations to be a part of what will no doubt be a life-changing experience for all involved in the 2015 Special Olympic World Games."

At Monday's event, the Knights were also named as a "Founding Champion of the World Games."

Also at that event, Archbishop José H. Gomez also announced the Archdiocese's spiritual support for the World Games.

"The Catholic community is happy and proud to welcome the Special Olympics to Los Angeles," Archbishop Gomez said. "The Special Olympics is a celebration of human dignity and a beautiful sign that our world is truly one family drawn from peoples of every race and language. We look forward to working with the Knights of Columbus, and we pray that this competition will promote solidarity and make all of us more aware of our common humanity."

In keeping with its long history of support for Special Olympics, K of C councils donated more than \$3.5 million to Special Olympics in 2013. Members also provided more than 250,000 hours of service at nearly 20,000 Special Olympics events. K of C councils also donated an additional \$13.5 million to a number of other projects assisting people with intellectual disabilities.
