THIS SECTION PROVIDES COMMENTS ON COUNTERING DESTRUCTIVE DEMONSTRATIONS AGAINST ST. JUNIPERO SERRA STATUES, OUR MISSION AND LOCAL CHURCHES HERE IN SANTA BARBARA

The following comes from a discussion that Mark Wieststock and District Deputy Chris Arnoult, and among others, had with Bishop Robert Barron. .

Good evening brothers:

Our brother trustee, PGK Mark Wietstock and our DD Chris Arnoult among others were able to attend today's zoom meeting by Dn Chris Sandner at the request of Bishop Robert Barron. Please read Mark's email below. It is time to take peaceful action and support our Catholic churches and missions. If you do have a RV or trailer to camp out near the mission, please contact myself and/or any of our officers. Thank you and God Bless Hank Peterson, GK

E-mail from Mark Weiststock:

I attended this afternoon's Zoom meeting which was convened by Deacon Chris Sandner at the request of Bishop Robert Barron. The meeting was called by the Bishop to engage in a discussion with as many representatives of the K of C Councils of our region, to see what ideas/assistance we might be able to offer on the subject of protecting the property and artifacts of Missions and other Catholic parish properties throughout the northern reaches of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles. The names of those in attendance I noted were: Bishop Robert Barron, Deacon Chris Sandner, myself, Dominic Costanzo, Joe Gray, Mike LoCollo, Robert Tarn, David Waage, Paul Calloway, Rodger Brennan and Chris Arnoult.

The Bishop's particular focus was on some kind of "demonstration" now planned for Mission Santa Ynez on **Sat. August 22** by some of the same groups/individuals who have been attacking our Church for years, and agitating for removal of all public displays of statues or other artifacts that memorialize the important role(s) our Church and its leaders have played in the earliest settlements and development of California, and continue to play today in supporting the daily lives of all people living in our communities. The target of this particular demonstration is apparently a statue of St. Junipero Serra located on the Mission property at Santa Ynez.

First, Bishop Barron wants to know what the Knights can do to help with organization/ attendance at a **counter demonstration on that date** to show, e.g., our support of the Mission and ALL its artifacts, including its Serra statue, and demonstrating our resolve to protect our Missions and other parishes against vandalism and other malicious acts by a tiny minority of people who routinely defame our Church and its historic leaders, and who have most recently gotten much more aggressive in their attempts to malign the Church, and deface/destroy its properties.

Secondly, Bishop Barron wants to know if there are any men among us who would be able/willing to assist with creating a schedule for peaceful overnight surveillance at our Missions/parishes, just to demonstrate to any of these would-be evildoers that the Church environs are *(Continued on Page 3)*

being watched, and hopefully deter, e.g., acts of loitering and vandalism by those who come to these places, typically in the middle of the night, only to do harm..

Any presence/assistance would be welcomed, but would have to be coordinated/approved with each pastor. Our initial thought was that the brothers best suited to offer such assistance would be those with, e.g., RV's or other self-contained camping vehicles, who would stay overnight at locations convenient for them, and as their schedules/resources permit, on whatever rotating schedule(s) that could be arranged among the willing/able.

Everyone in attendance informed the Bishop/Chris that they would immediately report the subject of the meeting to their respective councils/officers, and then return for a follow-up Zoom conference this Thursday, July 30, also at 3:00 p.m..

Our State and local governments may be making it difficult, but as the people of God we will find a way.



DEVIL-WORSHIPERS ADMIT ABORTION A SATANIC RITUAL

or decades, pro-lifers have compared abortion to a satanic rite. Years ago, a priest listed the chilling parallels between abortion and the hideous satanic ritual called the Black Mass, which involves a naked, supine woman and the sacrificial murder of a baby. Once I even saw a bumper sticker that read, "Abortion: Child Sacrifice / Ritual Murder."

Now, at last, the devil's disciples are admitting that abortion is a satanic rite — in fact, they're trumpeting it. Christian Life Daily reports that the Satanic Temple, a growing cult, said recently that murdering an unborn baby is a religious ritual "similar to communion or baptism for Christians." (God forgive that blasphemy!) The group, as "a federally-recognized religion," says the Religious Freedom Restoration Act should exempt first-trimester abortions from "unnecessary regulations."

A cult video declares, "The Satanic Temple is proud to announce its Religious Abortion Ritual, a ceremony rooted in our deeply-held beliefs." "Thyself is thy master," it blares. "Hail[,] Satan!" The cult's ritual, which the group details, asserts that "one's body is...subject to one's own will alone" — the same line that radical feminists have always used to justify killing their babies' bodies.

Arguing against state laws that give some protection to unborn babies, cult spokeswoman Jane Essex says, "No Christian would tolerate [a law] that insists...counseling is necessary before someone can be baptized. Our members are justly entitled to religious liberty in order to practice our rituals as well."

Besides denying and trampling unborn babies' rights, former Satanist Zachary King points out, the ritual is a sacrifice to Satan himself: "...to get Satan's approval, to give you something that you want, killing something is the best way to go." "Killing something is the ultimate offering to Satan," he stresses, "and if you can kill an unborn [baby], that is his ultimate goal.

When the world's public officials let millions sacrifice their unborn babies to Satan, yet in the name of public health prevent million of Masses and billions of Holy Communions, you know our world is in a desperate situation. May God have mercy on us, through the intercession of His Holy Mother Mary!

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Hank Peterson: Here is an outstanding letter of St. Juinipero Serra written by Archbishop Gomez

Letter to the Faithful for the Memorial of St. Junípero Serra Archbishop José H. Gomez - New World of Faith June 29, 2020

In the following letter, Archbishop José H. Gomez addresses recent controversies surrounding public monuments to St. Junipero Serra and asks the faithful of the Archdiocese of Los Angeles to invoke the saint's "intercession for this nation that he helped to found." Ahead of the saint's July 1 feast day, he urges prayers especially for "an end to racial prejudice and a new awareness of what it means that all men and women are created equal as children of God." Archbishop Gomez also offers an original spiritual meditation that he composed almost entirely from words drawn from St. Junipero's sermon and letters.

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Recently, statues to the Apostle of California, St. Junípero Serra, were torn down in San Francisco and in the plaza outside our first church, Nuestra Señora Reina de los Ángeles, in downtown Los Angeles. Up and down the state, there is growing debate about removing St. Junípero memorials from public lands. Ventura officials have announced that they will hold a public hearing July 7 to debate whether to take down his statue from in front of Ventura City Hall.

Faced with the possibility of vandalism, we are taking increased security precautions at the historic missions located in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles. Unfortunately, we will probably have to relocate some statues to our beloved saint or risk their desecration.

These developments sadden me. I have been thinking and writing about St. Junípero for many years now.

I understand the deep pain being expressed by some native peoples in California. But I also believe Fray Junípero is a saint for our times, the spiritual founder of Los Angeles, a champion of human rights, and this country's first Hispanic saint. I was privileged to celebrate his canonization Mass with Pope Francis in 2015. I rely on his intercession in my ministry, and I am inspired by his desire to bring God's tender mercy to every person.

The exploitation of America's first peoples, the destruction of their ancient civilizations, is a historic tragedy. Crimes committed against their ancestors continue to shape the lives and futures of native peoples today. Generations have passed and our country still has not done enough to make things right.

In the family of God here in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles, we have worked hard to atone for past errors and wrongs and to find the path forward together. We honor the contributions that native peoples made to building the Church in Southern California and we cherish their gifts in the mission of the Church today.

Over the years, I have come to understand how the image of Father Serra and the missions evokes painful memories for some people. For that reason, I believe the protests over our history in California, and the broader protests that have started elsewhere in the country over historical monuments,

are important.

Historical memory is the soul of every nation. What we remember about our past and how we remember it defines our national identity — the kind of people we want to be, the values and principles we want to live by.

But history is complicated. The facts matter, distinctions need to be made, and the truth counts. We cannot learn history's lessons or heal old wounds unless we understand what really happened, how it happened, and why.

Our society may reach a consensus not to honor St. Junípero or various other figures from our past. But elected officials cannot abdicate their responsibilities by turning these decisions over to small groups of protesters, allowing them to vandalize public monuments. This is not how a great democracy should function.

Allowing the free expression of public opinion is important. So is upholding the rule of law and ensuring that decisions we reach as a society are based on genuine dialogue and the search for truth and the common good.

In this regard, how the City of Ventura is handling the debate over its Serra monument can be a model for thoughtful and respectful public discourse that includes civil authorities, indigenous leaders, representatives of the Church, and the community at large.

In other cases, it is clear that those attacking St. Junípero's good name and vandalizing his memorials do not know his true character or the actual historical record.

The sad truth is that, beginning decades ago, activists started "revising" history to make St. Junípero the focus of all the abuses committed against California's indigenous peoples.

But the crimes and abuses that our saint is blamed for — slanders that are spread widely today over the internet and sometimes repeated by public figures — actually happened long after his death.

It was California's first governor who called for "a war of extermination" against the Indians and called in the U.S. Cavalry to help carry out his genocidal plans. That was in 1851. St. Junípero died in 1784.

The real St. Junípero fought a colonial system where natives were regarded as "barbarians" and "savages," whose only value was to serve the appetites of the white man. For St. Junípero, this colonial ideology was a blasphemy against the God who has "created (all men and women) and redeemed them with the most precious blood of his Son."

He lived and worked alongside native peoples and spent his whole career defending their humanity and protesting crimes and indignities committed against them. Among the injustices he struggled against, we find heartbreaking passages in his letters where he decries the daily sexual abuse of indigenous women by colonial soldiers.

For St. Junípero, the natives were not just powerless victims of colonial brutality. In his letters, he describes their "gentleness and peaceful dispositions," he celebrates their creativity and knowledge; he remembers little acts of kindness and generosity, even the sweet sound of their voices as they sang.

He learned their languages and their ancient customs and ways. St. Junipero came not to conquer, he came to be a brother. "We have all come here and remained here for the sole purpose of their well-being and salvation," he once wrote. "And I believe everyone realizes we love them."

I like to think that his deep reverence for creation was influenced by his conversations and observations among this land's first peoples.

St. Junípero became one of America's first environmentalists, documenting California's diverse habitats in diary entries and letters where he described mountains and plains, the blazing sun and the effects of drought, the overflow of brooks and rivers, cottonwood and willow trees, roses in bloom, the roar of a mountain lion that kept the missionaries awake at night.

St. Junipero also understood that the souls of indigenous Americans had been darkened with bitterness and rage at their historic mistreatment and the atrocities committed against them.

In 1775, when Kumeyaay attackers burned down the mission in San Diego, torturing and murdering his dear friend, Father Luís Jayme, California's first martyr, St. Junípero was not outraged. He was concerned for the killers' souls. He pleaded with authorities to have mercy.

"As for the culprits, their offense should be forgiven after some slight punishment," he said. "By doing so they would see we were putting into practice the rule we teach them — to return good for evil and to pardon our enemies."

This may be the first moral argument against the use of the death penalty in American history. And St. Junípero was arguing against its imposition on an oppressed minority.

St. Junípero was 60 years old when he traveled 2,000 miles from Carmel to Mexico City to protest the injustices of the colonial system and demand that authorities adopt a "bill of rights" that he had written for the native peoples.

That was in 1773, three years before America's founders declared this nation's independence with those beautiful words: "all men are created equal ... endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights."

Pope Francis called St. Junípero "one of the founding fathers of the United States." He recognized that the saint's witness anticipated the great spirit of human equality and liberty under God that has come to define the American project.

Yet in online petitions today we find St. Junipero compared to Adolf Hitler, his missions compared to concentration camps. No serious historian would accept this, and we should not allow these libels to be made in public arguments about our great saint.

Despite their many flaws, the California missions were similar to some of the other communes and "communitarian" societies we find in early American history.

The missions were multicultural communities of worship and work, with their own governments and a self-sustaining economy based on agriculture and handicrafts. Living and working together, Natives and Spaniards created a new, mestizo ("mixed") culture reflected in the distinctive art, architecture, music, poetry, and prayers that came out of the missions.

It is sadly true that corporal punishment was sometimes used in the missions, as it was practiced throughout late 18th-century society. It is also true that some natives died of diseases in the missions.

But the tragic ruin of native populations occurred long after St. Junípero was gone and the missions were closed or "secularized." Serious scholars conclude that St. Junípero himself was a gentle man and there were no physical abuses or forced conversions while he was president of the mission system.

St. Junípero did not impose Christianity, he proposed it. For him, the greatest gift he could offer was to bring people to the encounter with Jesus Christ. Living in the missions was always voluntary, and in the end just 10-20% of California's native population ever joined him.

My brothers and sisters, this is the truth about St. Junípero.

In this hour of trial in our nation, when once again we are confronting America's shameful legacy of racism, I invite you to join me in observing St. Junípero's feast day, July 1, as a day of prayer, fasting, and charity.

Let us pray with him for healing, reconciliation, an increase in empathy and understanding, an end to racial prejudice, and a new awareness of what it means that all men and women are created equal as children of God.

Every true reform begins in the human heart, and St. Junipero would tell us that only mercy and pardon and true contrition can move us forward at this moment in our history.

I have spent these recent days praying and reflecting on his life and writings and I have prepared a spiritual medJunípero's sermons and letters.

I offer this meditation, along with this letter, for your prayer and reflection as we work together to promote the healing of memories and an end to the racism that still plagues our nation's systems and institutions.

Pray for me and I will pray for you. May God grant peace to you and your families. I entrust all of us to the Immaculate Heart of Mary our Blessed Mother.

THE KNIGHT WHO LAUNCHED BEATLEMANIA

HOW ED SULLIVAN, A KNIGHT,
HELPED CHANGE THE LANDSCAPE OF MUSIC, COMEDY AND THEATER

It was Sunday, Feb. 9, 1964. More than 73 million Americans gathered around their television sets for *The Ed Sullivan Show*. Audiences had already witnessed iconic moments since it began in 1948, including a breakthrough performance by Elvis Presley on Sept. 9, 1956, which still holds the record for largest audience share for a

series episode in television history with 82.6 percent of the national TV audience. But this night was different. This night the American public would see a band from across the pond that would initiate an international phenomenon.

With five words, host Ed Sullivan — a member of the Knight of Columbus — launched what would become known as Beatlemania. "Ladies and gentlemen, The Beatles!"

Almost drowned out by the screaming, adoring fans, the Beatles played "All My Loving," "Till There Was You," "She Loves You," and then concluded the broadcast with "I Saw Her Standing There" and "I Want to Hold Your Hand." This debut American performance influenced the course of music and television history. The popularity of The Beatles skyrocket-



ed and those who witnessed the show, including future rock n' roll stars like Tom Petty, Gene Simmons, Billy Joel and countless others, point to the *Ed Sullivan Show* as an influential moment that made them want to become musicians.

The Beatles would appear several more times on the *Ed Sullivan Show*, a program that continued to be a make-orbreak touchstone for other musical acts such as The Doors, the Rolling Stones, Marvin Gaye and The Supremes as well as comedy like for Rodney Dangerfield, George Carlin, Carol Burnett and Richard Pryor. A few years prior to The Beatles' first appearance on the show, in 1957, Ed Sullivan invited then-Supreme Knight Luke Hart to accept an introduction from the studio audience to mark the Order's 75th anniversary. As Supreme Knight Hart would say in his address at the Supreme Convention that year, he accepted Sullivan's offer and called him "brother," signifying that he was a fellow Knight.

"It is said that [Sullivan] had an audience that night of forty million and I can well believe it, for the next day, I received many messages from people who had seen it — some from points as far distant as Seattle, Santa Fe, Houston, Jacksonville and Montreal," Hart said.

Members of the Knights of Columbus, from Babe Ruth to President John F. Kennedy, have been stewards of culture, leaving a momentous mark on American society. Ed Sullivan's show was voted number 31 in *TV Guide* Magazine's 60 Best Series of All Time, after it ended its 23-year run on June 6, 1971.

Ed Sullivan, and other Knights' impact on history, is explored in the new book *The Knights of Columbus: An Illustrated History*. The book features inspiring stories from more than 135 years of charity and fraternity paired with hundreds of the best photos from the Knights of Columbus archives.

Influencing everything from local parish life to international pop culture, the more than two million Knights around the world continue to leave their mark.
