Praise the lord for recovery of Larry Torres who is back at work.







Financial Secretary's Report 16 Feb – 15 March 2002



The council recorded expenses of \$1.977.33 and income of \$2.698.55 during the Feb 16, 2002 through March 15, 2002 period. In addition to normal expenses for pantry supplies, office copying, and meeting refreshments. the 16 expense items included \$1,01870 for the continuing Lenten fish fries (Including \$80 to the Youth Group for their help); \$160.55 for he February bulletin; \$100 to Los Padres Chapter for the councils portion of the hospitality room at convention in the state \$115.54 for the Blue/Gold Scout's dinner; \$187.47 for a new drum for the council's laser printer; and \$100 to Catholic Charities.

The income included \$2,628.55 total from the second, third, and fourth fish fries; and \$70 in member dues.

Membership was unchanged during this period, and remains at 204.

March 24th was Palm Sunday, the day which marks the beginning of Holy Week, a most active week in our Church's year. The day was a traditionally typical day for Council 5300, too, which has its focus on service to the Community of St Raphael and the greater Sana Barbara/Goleta community. Tom and Patricia Puerling began the day, setting up the Parish Hall for the Parish Pancake Breakfast. Ralph Wengler, master of pancake mixing, egg cracking and sausage turning had a solid crew of "kitchen aides": Joe Ponce, Jose Mesa, Mell Hueston, again Tom Puerling and Jack Turney. Mike Donovan was on ticket sales, maintaining the count: 125 adults, 17 children, 2 clergy and 7 crewmembers. The Council is always appreciative of the contributions of Teo Nungarary who regularly maintains the facilities, tables and chairs in good order. Larry Torres established the Blood Bank stations, assisted by just the right "types" of time and energy donors: Livia Dodero, Hal Thompson, Eleanor Paulazzo and Joe Lima. The successful drive resulted in 45 parishioners volunteering to donate; 39 units of blood were approved.

Junipero Serra Assembly Fourth Degree Report By: James Abels, Faithful Navigator





Gifts of great spiritual significance are selected, a pyx for the transer of Eucharist to the homebound or a chalice for the celebration of Eucharist. The presentation of the gift with its inscription In Memoriam, S/K John J. Doe, is made during the memorial service when possible. family of the honored Sir Knight may retain the gift or it may determine to donate the pyx or chalice to a mission in the United States or one of its territories or perhaps to an overseas diocese. If the chalice or pyx is to be sent to a mission, the Assembly contacts the receiving diocese to guarantee its necessity, the correct destination and use of the gift as well as absorbing all costs involved with for its engraving, insuring and mailing. The pairsh in the diocese which receives the memorial gft is requested to acknowledge its receipt and that the honored Sir Knight and his family will be remembered when the gift is used.





Our Lady of Guadalupe Her Cingulum or Black Sash

Our Lady of Guadalupe wears the traditional Cingulum or black sash around her waist. There are two historical beliefs as to the wearing of this sash and both can be applied to Our Lady of Guadalupe, the Mother of God.

One tradition states that this sash was worn by all young, unmarried women and was removed only upon her marriage. It is a symbol of perfect chastity.

In the second tradition, it is tied in a bow of the traditional Aztec black sash. All of the native women in this region of Mexico would have worn this black band to signify that they were with child. This simple piece of clothing was meant to set them apart so that no harm would come to them or to the child within them. Our Lady of Guadalupe then was pregnant with the Christ who was about to be born anew in the New World of the Americas.

On the 12th of December in 1531, Our Lady reminded Blessed Juan Diego: "Am I not here who am your mother? Am I not your fountain of life?"

Blessed are you, God, Our Father, to have created Mary so beautiful and for having given her to us as our Mother at the foot of Jesus' cross. Blessed are you for having called us, like St. Bernadette, to see Mary in your light and to drink from the wellspring of your heart. Mary, you know the poverty and the sins in our lives and the lives of the world. We want to entrust ourselves to you, today, totally and without reservation. Through you, we will be reborn everyday through the power of the Holy Spirit. We will live the life of Jesus, serving our brothers. Mary, teach us to carry the life of the Lord within ourselves. Teach us the "yes" in your heart.

Dear Brother,

I am writing to ask for your help. The 365 Club with its Parade of the Grand Knights is the only means of raising funds to support Columbian Charities. If you currently don't, supporting Columbian Charities through the **365** Club program, I respectfully request that your council consider.

What is the 365 Club?

The '365 Club' is composed of members of the Knights of Columbus in California that contributes a penny a day to the California Columbian Charities Inc. for the purpose of helping Brother Knights who are in financial distress. Knights can become a member by:

Paying the additional \$3.65 that could be added to the dues statement that is billed to members as a voluntary assessment. When the \$3.65 is paid, the Financial Secretary places a red 365 decal on the members travel card to indicate that he is a member of the '365 Club'.

Some other ways to help your brother:

- 1. Donating when councils take up a collection at council meetings for the '365 Club'.
- 2. Fund raiser dedicated to California Columbian Charities, Inc.
- 3. Make a personal donation to California Columbian Charities, Inc.

The donations to the '365 Club' are held at the council until May of each year when these funds are presented to the State Deputy during the parade of the Grand Knights at the annual Convention.

The State Council as a non-profit corporation for the purpose of raising funds to assist Brother Knight's and or Widow of Deceased knights who are in financial distress formed Columbian Charities about fifty years ago. Columbian Charities does not receive funds from the California State Council.
