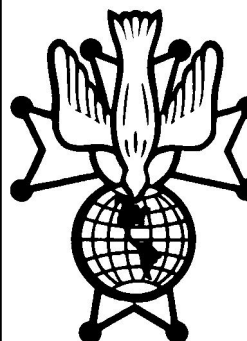

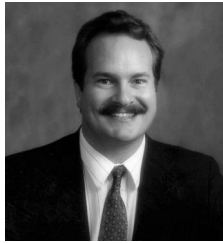
## CHANCELLOR'S REPORT

**Financial Secretary's Report**  
**16 June – 15 July 2002**



The council recorded expenses of \$2,634.87 and income of \$1,064 during the June 16, 2002 through July 15, 2002 period. In addition to normal expenses for pantry supplies, office copying, and meeting refreshments, the 13 expense items included \$797.85 for the first half of the 2002/2003 state per capita tax; \$243.25 for the Supreme per capita tax; 518.40 in expenses (Food, decorations, entertainment) for the Grand Knight's Awards dinner; \$215 for ads in the special edition of the Spirit in honor of Msgr. Steve; \$500 starter money for the Fiesta Coke booth; \$130 for a state convention hotel room; and \$100 to Catholic Charities.

The income items were \$630 from the Grand Knight's Awards dinner and \$434 from member payments.

The council had no change in membership, which remains at 204.

### The Founder of the Knights of Columbus



Over a century ago, in mid-August of 1890, one of the largest funerals in the history of Waterbury, Connecticut, took place. The throngs who attended were grieving the death, at age 38, of Father Michael J. McGivney, founder of the Knights of Columbus

Delegations were present from almost every one of the 57 Knights of Columbus councils that had been chartered in the Order's first eight years. The Bishop of Hartford and more than 70 of Connecticut's Catholic priests were joined by many civic leaders. It was reported that every available carriage for miles around had been rented for the great procession.

Father McGivney's funeral was an indication of the love and respect the people felt for this hard-working, holy, parish priest. It also reflected the deep personal appeal that immigrant Catholics immediately found in the Knights of Columbus. Since that time, the Order's growth has never stopped. Today it is the largest society of Catholic men in the world, with 1.6 million members in the United States, Canada, the Philippines, Mexico, and several Central American and Caribbean countries.

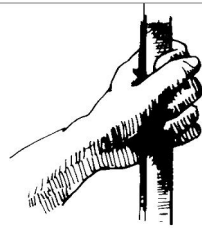
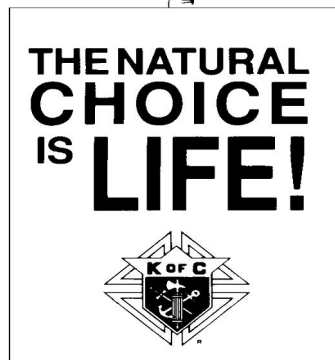
To mark the Order's hundredth anniversary in 1982, the Knights of Columbus brought the remains of Father McGivney from Waterbury back to St. Mary's Church in New Haven, where he had founded the Order. There he now rests in a setting in which daily Mass is offered for the deceased members and their deceased spouses of the Order and prayers are said in his honor. His cause for canonization is proceeding.

**THE NATURAL CHOICE IS LIFE!**

**A Pro-Life Message**

As it is summertime and many of our members are on vacation, in the absence of Bob and Cecilia Marks, I am attempting to write this article. Pro-Life forces fight the sanctity of human life on numerous battlefronts. One such front is in the area of public relations, where abortion advocates have skillfully utilized symbolism and wording to advance their cause. Those who promote abortion on demand have been successful in persuading the public that being “pro-choice” with regards to abortion is consistent with the American Way, having all options open. This movement for abortion rights has taken on a life all of its own and does not require that members of the public support abortion. Rather, it asserts that people need only to be for the right to choose. Proponents of abortion maintain that while one may believe that abortion is wrong, one should acknowledge another’s viewpoint is equally valid (as long as that viewpoint agrees with their basic “humanist” philosophy). Supporters of abortion recoil at the reality that they are pro-abortion. To counter this, they argue they are simply pro-choice, respecting only the views of those who agree with them, and that if one dares to rationally think for themselves and have an opposing viewpoint, they are somehow “radical and intolerant.” This is in sharp contrast to the attitude that American pluralism requires that differing views be “tolerated,” and one who is tolerant has an enlightened attitude. Public opinion polls on abortion, however, do reveal a paradox. When asked specific questions about abortion, such as when an abortion should be allowed, respondents overwhelmingly show strong pro-life opinions. But, when asked to describe their positions regarding abortion, a majority of the respondents said they were pro-choice.

This on-going abortion debate has focused on the conflicting and competing values of “life” and “choice.” When pro-life advocates are painted by the media as anti-choice, bigoted and intolerant, the movement is demeaned in public opinion. However, when pro-life people are shown as supporters of life, meaning both the lives of the mother and the unborn child, the public’s perception of the movement is positive.

This paradox has led to confusing State laws and how they are enforced across our Country. In some states, such as Texas, a fetus is considered a life after twenty weeks, and has rights. If this is true, why then is not abortion considered murder and prosecuted as such? (Other than the usual intolerance accusations, the humanists have no answer).

The power of words and how they are crafted, has the known ability to move and persuade public opinion most dramatically.

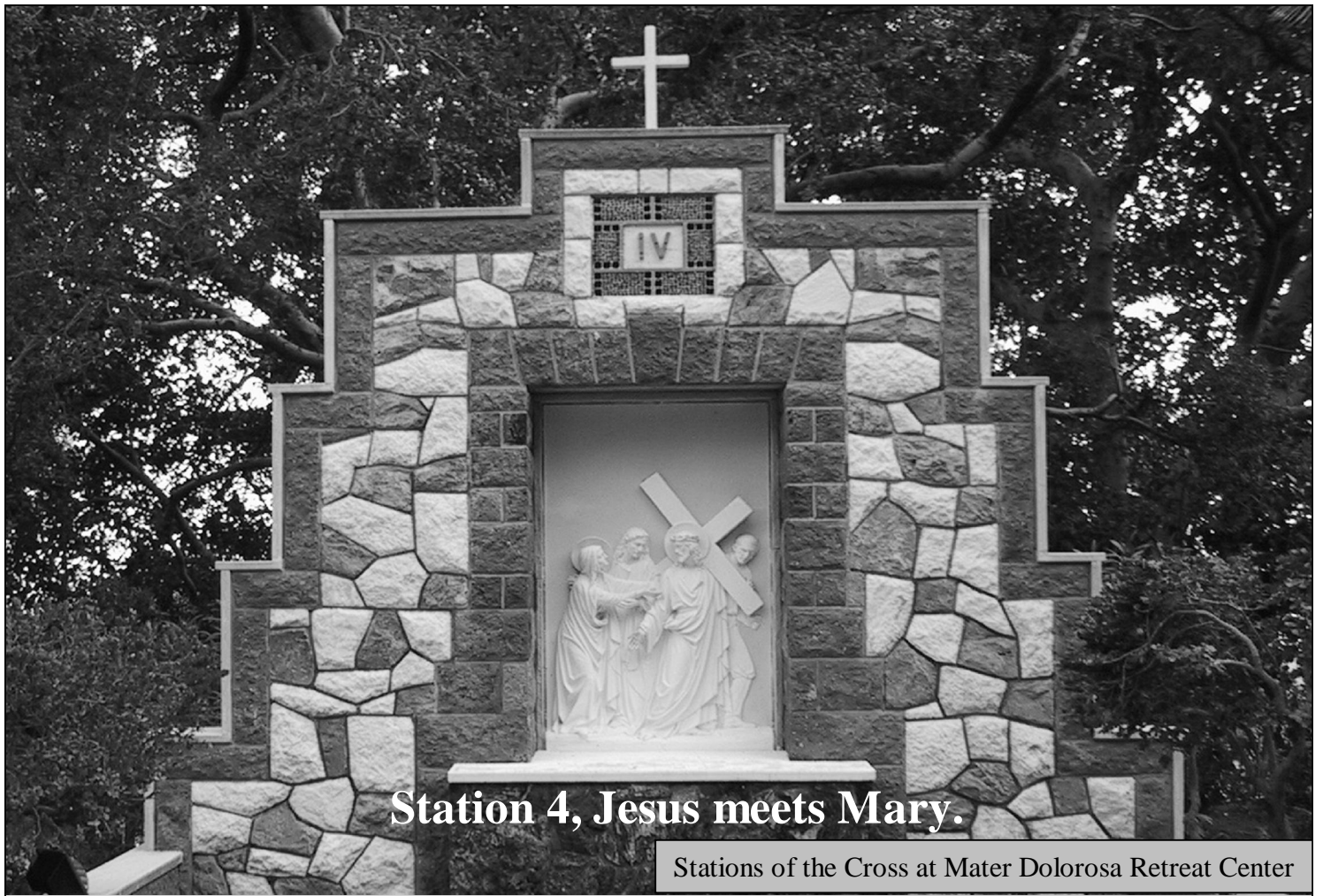
