We Knights have enjoyed a colorful and festive Old Spanish Days Fiesta for the year 2002. Chairman, Rich Scholl, and Worthy Grand Knight, Brian Klinge want to thank all of the Knights, spouses, family members and friends, who have helped in making this event another success. The Kinghts of Columbus realized over \$3600 n net income, which will be used for helping those in need and supporting our charitable causes. We served an estimate 5000 cups of Coke and other beverages and 700 bottles of water during the four days we operated. Our gross sales were very close to last year, We continued to experience drink competition from other booths serving lemonade, water and tea, but this year we added water to our menu and competed quite successfully in that area. Perhaps, next year we might want to consider another product to add to our menu to increase sales.

Financial Secretary's Report 16 July – 15 August 2002

The council recorded expenses of \$2,921.44 and income of \$6,966.36 during the July 16, 2002 through August 15, 2002 period. In addition to normal expenses for pantry supplies, office and copying. meeting refreshments, the 18 expense items included \$1,408.90 of Fiesta Coke booth expenses (including \$640 for half of the total booth rent); \$410 for the grand knights past ring; \$463.94 for the printing of three different editions of the bulletin; \$83.34 for Father's Day cards; and \$100 to Catholic Charities.

The Fiesta Coke booth provided gross income of \$6,913.36. The other income items were \$17 from the business meeting raffle and \$36 from member payments.


Coyne, Roberta & Paul

Although he seldom attends our business meetings, it is through his "silent activity" that he ceaselessly contributes.



Fiesta Coke Booth 2002 Knightline Article



We had a very efficient booth construction team of Mike Donovan, Leonard Gonzales, Tom Puerling, Frank Castelo and Al Meckelborg. Brian Klinge and his son and also Larry Torres and Tom Puerling were there to tear down the booth on Sunday. Larry Torres arrived early and worked so fast that the others though the booth might have been stolen. Every year, it seems that the City moves the light pole and tree a little within our booth so that we have to adjust the holes in our floor. Putting in the floor is kind of like putting together a jigsaw puzzle, which makes it quite challenging. This year, Frank Castelo bought a couple sheets of plywood and made a new jigsaw puzzle, so to speak. The old pieces just did not fit anymore. Each year we plan to take a picture of the floor, or mark the wood pieces or draw a diagram, but on Sunday we only think of taking it down as fast as possible and getting it back in storage.

The captains and crews performed incredibly and appeared to enjoy themselves, as well. Once again the beverage dispensing equipment performed flawlessly and the convenient set up provided by Bob Montanes of Arcady Distributing was appreciated. The Gospel of Life promotes the protection and dignity of all human life from conception until natural death. During a recent K of C meeting, a member from the Visiting Nurses Hospice of Santa Barbara spoke about their organization. Made up mostly of volunteers, they need to be acknowledged for the work they do—theirs' is a quiet ministry.

I wish to share a personal experience of these people at work. Several years ago the mother of a friend of mine was diagnosed with cancer. She lived in Orange County but as the cancer grew worse my friend wanted her mother closer so she could visit with her on a daily basis. The local Hospice program was able to offer a room in Serenity House where she received 24-hour care. My wife and I would meet with our friend and visit her mother each Friday after which we would go for coffee. One Friday as we were saying goodnight, I leaned over to kiss my friend's mother. She laughed and said, "Oh, Bob that beard of yours tickles!" I was rather startled at the unexpected comment but also deeply touched. Here was a woman dying of cancer and on a morphine drip for the pain. Yet she had the ability to laugh! She died before another Friday came around, however, I remained touched by the incident. She had given me hope that I too might be able to approach death with such dignity. I still feel a respect for this wonderful woman and I show it by keeping my beard in her memory.

The Hospice organization helped to preserve the dignity of this lady and gave me a great admiration for the much needed work that they do.



Knights Celebrate Founders Birthday






