GRAND KNIGHT'S REPORT By Brian Klinge, Grand Knight





Clergy of the Month Order of Friars Minor





Francis of Assisi was born in 1181, the son of a wealthy cloth merchant and a noblewoman of Assisi. No one loved pleasure more than Francis; he had a ready wit, sang merrily, delighted in fine clothes and showy display. Handsome, gay, gallant, and courteous, he soon became the favorite among the young nobles of the town, the foremost in every feat of arms and the leader of civil revels. Francis joined a military campaign, was taken prisoner and held captive for more than a year. A long illness which he contracted there appears to have turned his thoughts to the things of eternity and the emptiness of the life he had been leading. In 1205 Francis made a pilgrimage to Rome and ended up exchanging clothes with a tattered mendicant and stood for the rest of the day fasting among the horde of beggars at the door of the basilica. Continuing his new way of giving money to the poor back in Assisi, he was renounced by his father at a hearing before the bishop, whereupon Francis publicly stripped off his clothes, gave them to his father and declared his father to be God. He adopted the simple peasant garb that is the habit of Franciscans today.

Francis rapidly attracted people of all walks of life to his simple wandering life of begging, caring for the poor and sick, and preaching. In 1209 Francis of Assisi obtained from the pope acceptance of the Order of Friars Minor under a simple rule he had composed for the guidance of his first companions. This rule was founded on observance of the apostolic life in the Gospel and requires the practice of absolute poverty, chastity, and obedience. By 1221, 5000 friars gathered in assembly, staying in mud and straw huts and waited on by knights and nobles. The order had become somewhat disorganized and unruly and Francis finished a more thorough rule for the order in 1223 and this is the one followed today. Throughout this period, Cardinal Ugolini, later Pope Gregory IX, guided and championed the order to maturity.

The order has been engaged in missionary work throughout the world from the outset and established the earliest Christian presence in many lands. Other ministries of the order include the monastic life, teaching in schools of all levels, taking care of parishes, writing in theology and philosophy, custody of the Holy Land, and care of the poor. It is a testimony to the virtues promoted by St. Francis and the Order, that many non-Catholics and even non-Christians are attracted to the study and practice of the ideals of the order.

Missionary zeal of Father Sera brought the Order of Friars Minor to the Santa Barbara area with the establishment of the Santa Barbara Presidio in 1782. Serra had been a distinguished university theologian but aspired to missionary work in Mexico in 1749. He was prevented by politics from establishing a Mission in Santa Barbara, but this was accomplished by Father Palou in 1786. The mission was originally an independent entity engaged in converting the local Indians to Christianity and a settled life. The Mexican government secularized the mission lands, but the Mission continued to function as parish, seminary, retreat center, and the religious heart of Santa Barbara. Fifteen members of the order now live at the Mission with about ten retired and the rest engaged in service to the parish and to the retreat center. Worldwide, there are about 18,000 members of the Order of Friars Minor.

Financial Secretary's Report 16 February – 15 March 2003



The council recorded expenses of \$2,227.66 and income of \$3,409.33 during the February 16, 2003 through March 15, 2003 period. In addition to normal expenses for office supplies, copying, and meeting refreshments, the 12 repense items included \$1,162.25 for Religios/Clergy Appreciation Night, \$603.82 for starter cash and supplies for the first Lent fish fry, \$132.72 to the scouts for the Pinewood Derby, \$100 to Los Padres Chapter for the hospitality room at the state convention, and \$100 to Catholic Charities.

Income consisted of \$1,253 from Religious/Clergy Appreciation Night, \$776.40 from the first fish fry, \$655.28 from Los Padres Chapte in reimbursement for use of our bulk mail permit last month, \$507 from the 23 February breakfast, and \$217.65 in member payments.

The council had no change in membership during this period. Membership remains at 200.

The attendance prize went unclaimed at the March business meeting. The April business meeting's attendance prize will be \$60.





GOSPEL OF LIFE To Condemn or to Convict

While in my late teens, I read an account of a daughter of a well known actor informing her father of her conversion to Catholicism. His response was, "Why would you wish to take on all that additional baggage?" In my ignorance I could not understand his question. Having been a cradle Catholic, I loved the Church and never saw the following of its rubrics as a burden. What was this "baggage" this father was referring to? Now in my fifties I understand the actor's comment.

Imagine God giving you an envelope with the following words written on it: "Mission Impossible." As you open the envelope and remove the neatly folded paper and you read: "You did not choose Me, it is I who chose you."--John 15:16 I AM calling you to a lifetime mission. If you accept this mission, I will never leave you or disavow you. My Son preceded you so He will be your example, your Way, to carry out this mission--rely on Him for He is "Faithful and Trustworthy." Should you err, just ask for My forgiveness and I will always grant this to you. For added measure, I will give you the Bread of Life to sustain you and to give you courage. I hope you accept this invitation for no one else can do this mission exactly as you can.....Love, Your Father" What does this have to do with abortion? Each of us has a mission in life. We are mothers and fathers, teachers and preachers, doctors and lawyers, politicians and gardeners. As a Catholic we are called to uphold the standard of Christ; to hold steadfast to the Gospel even when others are not.

The American Life League has launched the "Crusade for the Defense of our Catholic Church." Its goal is to convict publicly those Catholic politicians who support and/or advocate abortion. Pope John Paul II teaches in the Gospel of Life, #58:

"The moral gravity of procured abortion is apparent in all its truth if we recognize that we are dealing with murder..."

Canon Law 915 states:

"Those who have been excommunicated or interdicted after the imposition or the declaration of a penalty as well as others who obstinately persist in manifest grave sin are not to be admitted to Communion."


