<u>Father Marco Ortiz to Leave St. Raphael for New</u> <u>Assignment, Young Priest to Head Divine Saviour</u> <u>Parish of 2,700 Families</u>

Reverend Marco A. Ortiz, our Associate Pastor for the past 12 months, will be leaving St. Raphael's at the end of the month for a new assignment at Divine Saviour Church in Los Angeles as the Administrator of the Church where there are 900 to 1,000 First Communions every year. The 34-year old priest in such a short period of time has the parishioners marveling at his energetic, caring, reverent, attentive, unique, kind and loving personable attributes.

The native of Los Mochis, Mexico was born February 8, 1971. His parents, Enrique and Lucila Ortiz, moved to California in early 1990s. His father passed away in 1993. His mother now resides in Whittier as does a sister Rosie. His other sister Sonia lives in Mexico. Whenever he can he enjoys spending time with his family. After graduating from Miguel Hidalgo Grade School in Mexico, the family moved to Los Angeles where he graduated from Garfield High School in East Los Angeles. In response to how his initial call to the priesthood came about, Fr. Marco said, "Dealing with people has always been something that I enjoy very much. As a cashier at a grocery store was the way God called me to serve." The gifted speaker first entered the seminary in Tijuana in 1993 at age He then came to St. John's Seminary in 22. Camarillo where his ministerial training included assignments at St. Margaret Mary Alacoque in Lomita, Sts. Peter and Paul in Wilmington and "Interface" Family Counseling Services in Ventura County.

Financial Secretary's Report Ralph Wengler, Financial Secretary

To those who do not know me, I am Ralph Wengler, your Council 5300 Financial Secretary. My job is to receive all monies concerning Council business. I then have the responsibility to log them into my computer before turning them over to Joe Darga, the Council Treasurer. He then deposits the monies into the checking or charity account, as appropriate.

Outgoing funds have a more complex routing. Following the receipt of a bill, I prepare a Warrant Voucher, which is in a check format. I submit the voucher to the treasurer who copies the data onto a check blank. He signs his check and turns it over to me for my signature. After signing the check, I forward it to the addressee. When funds are requested without a formal bill, a Request for Check form is used which becomes the justification for the Warrant Voucher. In that way, a trail is established with enough information for the Trustees to do their monthly audit of our basic processing. Occasionally, payments are made by event chairmen out of cash receipts. This short-circuits the bookkeeping system, destroying the ability to have a paper trail. It is too easy for the perpetrators to take exception to the established system, expecting the F.S. to cover their tracks. The F.S. can only ignore the loss of receipts by logging actual receipts he received. The system of checks and balances use an inflexible computer which adds up all received money items and requires the treasurer to sign for the amount he has received. Naturally, when event receipts are spent before the money gets to the F.S.; the billing has no basis because no warrants or checks have been prepared. The payout never happened (according to the books).

Fr. Marco was ordained a priest on June 3, 2000 at Our Lady of Grace in Encino with Cardinal Roger Mahony presiding. His First Mass was celebrated in Sts. Peter and Paul Church in Wilmington. His four classmates were all immigrants. Santa Clara Church in Oxnard was his initial parish assignment for four years prior to coming to St. Raphael's in July 2004. It is here where for the past two years Father has a Spanish Catholic hour on radio teaching and promoting our Catholic Faith. His dream is to one day see the Archdiocese of Los Angeles have an FM radio station spreading the Good News. Every parish he has been a ssociated with has been beautiful. He has no favorite as each of his assignments has been a great opportunity to share the goodness of the Lord.

Asked to describe his new assignment, Father Marco stated, "My new parish is Divine Saviour and Father Miguel Plascencia, 78-years old, has been an Associate Pastor there for 20-years. There is a school and wonderful place for evangelization. The retiring Pastor, Father Thomas Boudraeu, is well liked by the community because of his devotion to God's people." "There are 2,700 registered families in the parish which is poor, needy and hungry of God," added Father Marco.

Father's most memorable occurrences have been when people needed a priest: crisis call, dying of a love one, etc. "Assisting people to get closer to God" was one of his main goals while at St. Raphael's Parish. Asked how he would describe St. Raphael Parish to his ordination classmates, Fr. Marco added, "St. Raphael's Parish Staff is a great team open to improvement. It is a very active parish in continuous spiritual growth. The generosity of the parishioners is admirable. Every time there is a chance to make the difference, St. Raphael's is there willing to help. After 12 months serving St. Raphael's the most satisfying thing has been assisting people in their relationship with God," Father exclaimed. He stated, "There is great joy when I see people coming back to the Church or growing in their relationship with the Lord." He added "The Sacrament of Reconciliation is a service that stands out as a cherished remembrance never to be forgotten."

Replying to what are the keys to his success as a young priest, Fr. Marco said, "It is not 'my ministry' it is God's. I remind myself every day that priesthood is a call to serve and to be served. I try to treat people the same way I would like to be treated."

Noted below are Father Marco's replies to other specific questions:

Q: What is your practical advice to youngsters concerning their faith?

A: First, I remind our youngsters never to let God go; there is no life without God. Second, I exhort them to know their Catholic faith.

Q: What has been your relationship with the children at St. Raphael School and the School of Religion?

A: I always try to be present as much as I can with the children. The most effective way to teach anything to our children is by example, therefore I treat them with love and respect so they may remember priests as kind and lovely servants of God.

Q: Do you see a vision of a healthier Catholic community in Goleta/Santa Barbara, shaped by the Gospel message of God's love for all people?

A: I see a lot of potential in our Catholic community of Santa Barbara. Besides praying for the faithful I also pray that our priests may continue assisting the faithful in Holy ways.

Q: Is there a Gospel story or passage that you return to again and again?

A: I love the parable of the "Prodigal Son." The love and mercy of God must be always appreciated.

Q: What is your favorite scriptural passage in the Bible?

A: One of my favorite Bible Passages is from the New Testament: 1 Corinthians 13 because it describes what love is all about.

Q: Have you had your heart-warming, inspiring homilies taped in the past?

A: Thanks for the compliment about my homilies but I never record them.

Q: Recommendations for "Seniors" in their twilight years?

A: Never forget to make the best out of their current lives. I always remind my mother and other seniors to enjoy life and to never be afraid because God is always there in our journey in this life.

Q: In your travels, have you seen the late Pope John Paul II?

A: I never met John Paul II in person; the only time I have been at the Vatican, the Pope was traveling around the world.

Q: How would you describe yourself to others regarding your God-given talents as a priest, superb speaker, healer (spiritual, emotional and physical), pastoral leader?

A: I describe myself as an assistant to people to get closer to God.

Q: What is the best way to honor the Blessed Virgin Mary as our spiritual mother?

A: The best way to honor Mary is to listen to her Son and to do as He says. As the mother of the Church, Mary is a model of holiness always saying "yes" to the will of God.

Q: What is your favorite thing to do on your day off? On your vacation?

A: I love going to the movies and traveling. I travel as often as possible.

Q: How many marriages have your performed at St. Raphael's?

A: I do not remember exactly but, probably close to 30.

Q: How difficult is it for a young priest to be reassigned after making so many friends during your short assignment here?

A: Change can be difficult...but I always remind myself that God's providence will always give me the grace to let go and to be open to new communities.

Q: Your association with Pastor Bruce Correio, Deacon Wayne Rascati, other staff members?

A: My association with other members of the clergy and staff is of collaboration in the ministry. We must have clear and common goals...we must walk together.

Q: What is your favorite meal? Do you cook?

A: I love seafood. I do enjoy cooking and hosting parties at the Rectory.

Chaplain's Report Rev Paul Rospond, Chaplain

Dear Brothers,

The Word I heard during my pilgrimage to So. America was about HOPE.

In Peru, our Maryknoll hosts took us to a series of barrios outside Lima called "Ciudad de Dios" (the city of God) It began with a "land invasion" on Christmas Eve in 1954 and has grown since. A land invasion? Homeless people, 1,000 or more at a time, march onto empty desert land and plant a new neighborhood. The land eventually gets annexed by the city. The place is dusty and dreary. Lima is surprisingly chilly. But as it never rains the initial shacks are just reed mats without roofs. We visited a free health clinic that specializes in pre-natal care and asthma treatment. We were welcomed by the pastoral workers at a local parish and by the ladies who run a library/after school study club. (no school libraries!)

Where's the HOPE? The people are moving from nothing to the possibility of something. They are striving. We heard the word "lucha" (as in personal struggle) again and again. It's a long road to build a decent house with a roof; they have something to share with us about struggling for a better life. The Maryknollers have offered a gospel Word of Hope there for nearly 50 years.

When we reached La Paz in Bolivia all was quiet, as it's name, "City of Peace" suggests. But this was after 3 weeks of strikes that shut down the country. (My Mom was very nervous about me going there and prayed for our group all the way). In our dialogue with University students they expressed hope that their country will be re-born as a result of this crisis. The immediate cause of the crisis is the question of nationalization of natural gas resources. But the real issue is participation in the politics and life of the country. Bolivians are 70% indigenous. Many do not speak Spanish. They have never had a say in how the country is run. The students we spoke to at the campus ministry center are among the first Amayra and Quecha people to get to college. They have a new vision for a Bolivia where all are included. So they speak with hope.

I was proud to see that Campus Ministry in on the scene speaking a Word of Faith and challenging students to walk in Faith

My reflections prompt me to ask, what's our struggle? What's our hope?
