#### **The New Bio. of Father McGivney**

It's been a while since I've read a life story of a saint. Yes, I know, the authors make a point that they are writing a history. They leave the proclamation of Fr. McGivney's sainthood to the Vatican process that's now under way. But they are telling the story of a man moved by love of God to serve God by serving the people around him. As a parish priest myself, I was inspired by the story.

The book gives excellent historical and cultural background. The struggle of the Irish immigrants in New Haven is an important part of the story. But this is also a very American story. Fr. McGivney saw the importance of establishing the Church in the context of American society and culture. My own religious community, the Paulists, has as its charism the inculturation of the Faith in American life and culture. I felt a strong bond with the young Fr. McGivney in this regard. He was the children of immigrants; he knew that struggle. Yet he was American and he was committed to making a synthesis of "American" and "Catholic."

Chapter One looks at Fr. McGivney's story through the experience of an Irish family devastated by the death of their breadwinner. Their young parish priest intervenes to sponsor one of the boys and keep the family together. In the process, he develops a vision of Catholic men uniting to aid families in need. This vision is one source of the idea for the Knights.

Another source is the temperance society in the parish. It's not only meant to keep young men on the straight and narrow, but also to be a healthy way for them to socialize, read and put on plays. The book explores the various fraternal societies of the 1870s and 1880s. This is yet another source of the idea of the Knights.

It is important for any society to look to the story of its founding. What were the needs it arose to meet? How were its initial ideals formed? This very readable biography will help us reflect on our continuing story as Knights, the needs we meet today and the ideals of unity and charity that we struggle to live out today.

You probably missed it in the rush of news last week, but there was actually a report that someone in Pakistan had published in a newspaper; an offer of a reward to anyone who killed an American, any American.

So, an Australian dentist wrote an editorial the following day to let everyone know what an American is...so they would know when they found one. (Good one, mate!!!!).

"An American is English, or French, or Italian, Irish, German, Spanish, Polish, Russian or Greek. An American may also be Canadian, Mexican, African, Indian, Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Australian, Iranian, Asian, or Arab, or Pakistani or Afghan. An American may also be a Comanche, Cherokee, Osage, Blackfoot, Navaho, Apache, Seminole or one of the many other tribes known as Native Americans. # St. Raphael Parishioner for past 34-years Pope Benedict XVI Recognizes Carlos Valenzuela, 4th Degree Knight With 'Benemerenti' Papal Award for Serving with Distinction

Carlos Cerpa Valenzuela, a 4th Degree Knight of Council 5300 since 1997, has been honored by Pope Benedict XVI with the Benemerenti Award for serving with distinction his Church, family and community. The announcement was made in December with the official presentation to be made at the Cathedral of the Angels on March 19<sup>th</sup> by Cardinal Roger Mahony. Pastor Bruce Correio made the recommendation to the Cardinal who forwarded it to the Pope.

"I never expected anything so I was surprised," said the active father of seven. He is very grateful to Father Bruce for his recommendation. "Everything I do is to help people get closer to God and to make a better community and parent," expressed the St. Raphael Parishioner for the past 34-years.

Carlos and Eva (Corral) were married in 1962 at Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Santa Barbara by Father Kelly. They are the proud parents of seven children, two girls, Evelia Valenzuela 41, Veronica Romero 40, and five boys, Carlos Jr. 39, Esteban 38, Catarino 37, Jose 35 and Eduardo 22. Also very special to them are seven grandchildren and one great-grandson: Joseph Mesa 23, Eric Mesa 20, Celene Melgoza 18, Amanda Valenzuela 17, Tyler Valenzuela 12, Alex Valenzuela 11, Joshua Romero 8 and great-grandson Christian Anthony Valenzuela, 13 months old.

The Valenzuelas are very active in the parish and community. For 20-years, Carlos and Eva have been involved with the Cursillo Prayer and

Meditation Movement, an intensive weekend-long renewal ministry for laypeople. "The Cursillo movement opened a different world for me," he said, recalling his first experience. From that point on, he was determined to share the practice with others, despite the fact that he was, at that time, holding down two jobs and raising seven children. Eventually he became responsible for directing the Cursillo in Santa Barbara, which involved regular trips to Los Angeles to coordinate with other Cursillo witnesses. "All this work I did was to help the Hispanic Community get closer to the Catholic Church and their Faith," emphasized Carlos.

Currently Carlos helps the Guadalupanos Hispanic leadership, the Knights of Columbus' Fish Fry during Lent, the Pancake Breakfasts, and special events at Christmas time when he dresses up as Santa Claus.

#### Carlos also:

- \* Helps in the Liturgy as a Lector and Usher.
- \* Assists Pastor Bruce Correio in keeping the St. Raphael Community united as one.
- \* Helps in the Evangelizing classes during CCD in Spanish.
- \* Serves as M.C. for certain events in the parish.
- \* Helps coordinate Fiesta Mexicana for the Guadalupanos with BBQ duties.
- \* Coordinates the feeding of 350 children in 45 minutes at the CCD retreat (Carlos has been doing this task for several years).
- \* Conducts the Cursillo's Marriage Encounter Program in both Spanish and English (Carlos has been conducting the program for 6 years).

Some of his goals as a leader in the Spanish community include seeing more people involved in the community and to be more responsible as a lay person in the Church and community. The native of Guadalajara, Mexico stated, "Most important, to be a community of St. Raphael we are working to be more united."

Born on September 28, 1942 to Jose and Trinidad Valenzuela, Carlos has three sisters and three brothers: Socorro Ornelas, Martha Guillen, Maria

Castellanos, Ricardo, Beto and Jose who died eight years ago. His mother, now 90, lives in Santa Barbara while his father died 20 years ago.

His workplace for the past 43-years has been the Rancheros Visitadores, the world reknown horse riding organization headquartered in Santa Barbara. He has served as the Superintendent for the past 28 years. "For me Rancheros is like being at school because I learn something every day. I meet good people all the time and it is an honor to be part of the RV," smiled Carlos. He hopes to retire in two and a half years.

The enthusiastic Carlos joined the Knights of Columbus in October 1995 and became a 4th Degree Knight in October 1997. He has served as Inside and Outside Guard. Jim Provenza was his sponsor. When I was invited to join the KCs the first time I was not ready but on the second time I told myself you talk about "Unity and One Community," you better become a Knight and here I am happy to help in any way I can with my brothers," noted Carlos.

When asked the best thing about being a parishioner at St. Raphael's, Carlos stated, "By being involved with the Community of St. Raphael's in English and Spanish, my Family in Christ is bigger. When I go to Mass on Sunday in English or Spanish I feel at home at any Mass. It's good to see everybody and talk to all."

"We are one community," emphasized Valenzuela, who finds at the heart of his work a desire to "tear down the walls" between the English and Spanish-speaking communities. "I want to communicate with everybody."

"The St. Raphael priest who got me started in Cursillo 30 years ago and my new life as a Christian was Father John A. Niessen, 1972-76" remarked Carlos. Our pastor at that time was Rev. Henry A. Van Son (pastor 1969-78). Carlos noted that Father Stephen N. Downes (pastor 1987-2002) was the best inspiration for him to keep working in the Vineyards of the Lord. He thanks Father Bruce Correio (pastor since 2002) for keeping the St. Raphael Community going strong.

#### **Writer's Footnote:**

In 1992, Deacon Tony Varesio and his wife Rosemary were awarded the "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice" Award. This recognition was bestowed on them by Pope John Paul II and presented to them at Mass on May 31 by Episcopal Vicar Monsignor John Rohde and Father Stephen N. Downes. The Varesios were recognized for their continued service to Catholic Charities and to the Parish.

Also this past December, Fritz Cahill, 3rd Degree Knight, was given the "Pro Ecclesial et Pontifice" (for the Church and the Holy Father) Award for service to the ecclesial community. A feature story on Cahill will appear in the March issue of the *Knightline*.

Members of the Order should honor and assist these heroes and heroines in every way possible, through the Order's patriotic Fourth Degree.

Assemblies and councils can honor military personnel and veterans throughout the year by presenting them with *Patriotic Service Award* certificates. These vertical certificates are available for 25 cents each from the Supreme Council Supply Department, plus shipping and handling.

In addition to honoring them for their services, assemblies and councils can give their time in volunteering at veterans' hospitals, clinics and health care facilities. This is a great way to show veterans that their efforts and sacrifices are not forgotten. Councils can also send greeting or birthday cards to hospitalized veterans and military personnel stationed away from home.

Let the veterans and current members of the military know that the Knights of Columbus appreciate their service and sacrifice. Take the time to honor or assist them in a way that is worthy of their military service.

The Veterans Affair Voluntary Service, VAVS, is the vehicle that assemblies use in the *Serving Those Who Served* program. Through this service, the Knights of Columbus Fourth Degree Veteran's Hospital volunteers are organized by having one of their members become a certified representative at the hospital. Our certified members attend hospital meetings and organize efforts for K of C volunteers.

The Knights of Columbus currently has a VAVS Committee at almost every VA medical center and clinic in the United States, 97% of all VA facilities across the United States. These committees consist of at least one certified representative and, up to, three deputy representatives from the Knights of Columbus.

## Benedict XVI's First Encyclical: Christianity Elevates Love

"Deus Caritas Est" Published

VATICAN CITY, JAN. 25, 2006 (Zenit.org).-Benedict XVI has published his first encyclical to show how Christianity does not repress love, but elevates it.

"Deus Caritas Est" (God Is Love), published today, responds to one of the most common objections: "Doesn't the Church, with all her commandments and prohibitions, turn to bitterness the most precious thing in life?" asks the Pope.

The encyclical answers the question in two parts. The first reflects on love in its origin and different manifestations; the second, addresses the way in which the Church, as institution, must live the commandment of love.

The Holy Father begins by clarifying a generalized confusion, according to which the Church condemns "eros" -- love of attraction -- to accept only "agape" -- unconditional love.

#### A mere "thing"

"Nowadays Christianity of the past is often criticized as having been opposed to the body; and it is quite true that tendencies of this sort have always existed. Yet the contemporary way of exalting the body is deceptive," Benedict XVI points out in section No. 5 of the 15,000-word encyclical.

"Eros, reduced to pure 'sex,' has become a commodity, a mere 'thing' to be bought and sold, or rather, man himself becomes a commodity," he explains.

According to the Pope, this conception of love implies "a debasement of the human body: no

longer is it integrated into our overall existential freedom; no longer is it a vital expression of our whole being, but it is more or less relegated to the purely biological sphere."

"Christian faith, on the other hand, has always considered man a unity in duality, a reality in which spirit and matter compenetrate, and in which each is brought to a new nobility," the Holy Father writes. "True, eros tends to rise 'in ecstasy' towards the Divine, to lead us beyond ourselves; yet for this very reason it calls for a path of ascent, renunciation, purification and healing."

"It is part of love's growth towards higher levels and inward purification that it now seeks to become definitive, and it does so in a twofold sense: both in the sense of exclusivity (this particular person alone) and in the sense of being 'for ever."

Thus, the Holy Father explains, "eros directs man towards marriage, to a bond which is unique and definitive; thus, and only thus, does it fulfill its deepest purpose."

The text acknowledges: "Love is indeed 'ecstasy,' not in the sense of a moment of intoxication, but rather as a journey, an ongoing exodus out of the closed inward-looking self towards its liberation through self-giving, and thus towards authentic self-discovery and indeed the discovery of God."

#### Christ as model

According to the Pope, the example of "love in its most radical form" is Christ on the cross, "the culmination of that turning of God against himself in which he gives himself in order to raise man up and save him."

"It is there that this truth can be contemplated. It is from there that our definition of love must begin. In this contemplation the Christian discovers the path along which his life and love must move," he stresses.

The second part of the encyclical is entitled "The Practice of Love by the Church as a 'Community of Love."

The text acknowledges that love "will always prove necessary, even in the most just society. There is no ordering of the State so just that it can eliminate the need for a service of love."

"There will always be suffering which cries out for consolation and help," Benedict XVI writes. "There will always be loneliness. There will always be situations of material need where help in the form of concrete love of neighbor is indispensable.

"The State which would provide everything, absorbing everything into itself, would ultimately become a mere bureaucracy incapable of guaranteeing the very thing which the suffering person -- every person -- needs: namely, loving personal concern."

"Marxism had seen world revolution and its preliminaries as the panacea for the social problem: revolution and the subsequent collectivization of the means of production, so it was claimed, would immediately change things for the better," the Holy Father observes. "This illusion has vanished.

"We do not need a State which regulates and controls everything, but a State which, in accordance with the principle of subsidiarity, generously acknowledges and supports initiatives arising from the different social forces and combines spontaneity with closeness to those in need."

The Pope adds: "The Church is one of those living forces: she is alive with the love enkindled by the Spirit of Christ. This love does not simply offer people material help, but refreshment and care for their souls, something which often is even more necessary than material support."

#### **Ecclesial activity**

In this context, the Holy Father describes the "distinctiveness of the Church's charitable activity."

First, he points out that "Christian charitable activity, apart from its professional competence, must be based on the experience of a personal encounter with Christ, whose love touched believers' hearts, generating within them love for others."

Second, he points out that "Christian charitable activity must be independent of parties and ideologies. It is not a means of changing the world ideologically, and it is not at the service of worldly

stratagems, but it is a way of making present here and now the love which man always needs.

"The Christian's program -- the program of the Good Samaritan, the program of Jesus -- is 'a heart which sees.' This heart sees where love is needed and acts accordingly. Obviously when charitable activity is carried out by the Church as a communitarian initiative, the spontaneity of individuals must be combined with planning, foresight and cooperation with other similar institutions.

"Charity, furthermore, cannot be used as a means of engaging in what is nowadays considered proselytism. Love is free."

"A Christian knows when it is time to speak of God and when it is better to say nothing and to let love alone speak," notes the Pope, as a third and final point.

Benedict XVI concludes by giving examples of charity left by the saints.

He mentions Blessed Teresa of Calcutta on three occasions, and ends with a dialogue with the Virgin Mary, who "shows us what love is and whence it draws its origin and its constantly renewed power."

The following is an excerpt from the encyclical at www.vatican.va:

"God is love, and he who abides in love abides in God, and God abides in him" (1 Jn 4:16). These words from the First Letter of John express with remarkable clarity the heart of the Christian faith: the Christian image of God and the resulting image of mankind and its destiny. In the same verse, Saint John also offers a kind of summary of the Christian life: "We have come to know and to believe in the love God has for us".

We have come to believe in God's love: in these words the Christian can express the fundamental decision of his life. Being Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction. Saint John's Gospel describes that event in these words: "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that

whoever believes in him should ... have eternal life" (3:16). In acknowledging the centrality of love, Christian faith has retained the core of Israel's faith, while at the same time giving it new depth and breadth. The pious Jew prayed daily the words of the Book of Deuteronomy which expressed the heart of his existence: "Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God is one Lord, and you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul and with all your might" (6:4-5). Jesus united into a single precept this commandment of love for God and the commandment of love for neighbour found in the Book of Leviticus: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself" (19:18; cf. Mk 12:29-31). Since God has first loved us (cf. 1 Jn 4:10), love is now no longer a mere "command"; it is the response to the gift of love with which God draws near to us.
