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

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Food for Thought

Dear fellow Brother Knights of Columbus,

Lent is a call to conversion. One way the church proposes this conversion is by Fasting. Here are some reasons why Fast & Abstinence is followed during Lent. Throughout the Old and New Testaments, God clearly reveals to His people the need for fasting. Jesus, Our Lord, in the Gospel, taught that after He would ascend into heaven, His disciples must fast. The Holy Apostles clearly kept every Wednesday and Friday as days of fast and abstinence, as mentioned in the book of Acts. Fasting is not extraordinary - for the Christian it is a regular aspect of the spiritual life.

Fasting is depriving the body of food from midnight till noon. For the Christian, the hunger that results is a real call to be mindful of our thirst for God. It is a call to <u>identify</u> with the poor, whom God loves especially. It is a way for us, as mature men and women to rule our

Program Director's Report By Dan Knauss, Deputy Grand Knight



Someone once said that to recognize the signs of God, pay attention to your stirrings. Look closely when you feel the swell of joy within, or the tightness as your throat closes up in sorrow. Live in that moment, poke around in its corners, and feel the texture of its walls. Sit with it for awhile, long enough to sense the presence of God sitting with you.

For many of us, this attention falls in the realm of discipline. We are so consumed with the goings-on around us that slowing down and looking inward requires a determined act of will. For Christians, Lent is a time to do exactly that.

Beginning 40 days before Easter, Lent has traditionally been a time of looking inward, a time of selfevaluation and self-examination in order to identify one's sins and go through a process of repentance and renewal. Many Christians have fasted during portions of Lent, others have found ways to mark the days by "giving up" something that is particularly delightful to them, even if not sinful. For some, it's giving up sweets or red meat, for others cigarettes or alcohol, habits which oftentimes are picked up again when Easter rolls around.

#### <u>A Spiritual Thought</u>

We will be celebrating the Easter Triduum this year from Holy Thursday, March 20 to Easter Sunday, March 23. We will be focused on Christ's suffering and death just as we should be every day of our lives. As <u>St. Josemaria de Balaguer</u> states in the Way: "Jesus came to the Cross, after having prepared himself for thirty-three years, all his life! His disciples, if they really want to imitate him, have to convert their existence into a co-redemption of Love, with their own active and passive selfdenial." (page 340 of the Way/Furrow/the Forge by St. Josemaria de Balaguer).

As I am writing this report, I have just returned from the annual Chapter Dinner in Ventura. The dinner was a low key affair but very nice. Our State Deputy, Jim Scroggin, was the keynote speaker and spoke about a variety of issues. Brother Jim stated that he wants the Knights to focus on three main goals: membership, fraternal protection (insurance) and charitable projects such as the MR drive, wheelchair distribution, Special Olympics, etc. Brother Jim also asked that we make every effort to support Columbian Charities. Columbian Charities' funds are depleted right now since \$140,000 was given to the victims of last year's wildfires. Our immediate PCP, John Bravo, was the honoree at the dinner and was given a nice plaque in appreciation for all his hard work as last year's Chapter President.

Insurance Agent's Report David Farebrother, Field Agent

#### ADVERTISING OUR PRODUCTS DOES NOT JEOPARDIZE NON-PROFIT MAILING RATE

The attached material is taken from the on-line Domestic Mail Manual published by the United States Postal Service.

Note that section 2-2.1.8 specifically identifies the Knights of Columbus as on organization that is eligible for non-profit mailing rates. Section 6-3.4.2 states that, while mailings which include advertisements of insurance are normally not eligible for non-profit rates, such mailings are eligible if (1) the organization making the mailing is eligible, (2) the policy being advertised is designed for and primarily promoted to members, and (3) the coverage provided by the policy is "not generally otherwise commercially available". With regard to the definition of what insurance is not considered to be generally otherwise commercially available, section 6-3.4.2 states that such insurance includes insurance where "the coverage is provided by the non-profit itself (e.g. a non-profit fraternal benefit society exempt from the payment of federal income tax under section 501(c) (8) that offers life insurance to its members and is also the insurer).

Thus the Domestic Mail Manual makes it clear that a Knights of Columbus non-profit postage mailing can include an advertisement for Knights of Columbus insurance or for agents offering Knights of Columbus insurance.

#### USCB Catholic Studies Update

A couple of Knightline issues back, this space opened a window on the UCSB Catholic Studies Program which was founded in part by a generous gift from Brother Chuck Burke (PGK, deceased) and his wife Harriet Burke. This time, I hope to give you a quick look at the Catholic Studies Program at UCSB. An introduction to the program could be this quote from the UCSB Religious Studies webpage, "...Catholic Studies draws upon the resources of the university as a whole in order to understand Catholicism as a global religious tradition that has taken different cultural forms in various times and places. We encourage the study of Catholicism as it has engaged with, shaped, and been shaped by other traditions, cultures, and intellectual systems."

Phheww! I'm glad I'm not taking a class in interpretation of what those last sentences mean. It sounds like typical university course catalog double-speak. Maybe a better approach is to look at what course studies are available, what are the levels of instruction and the estimated student enrollment. The following is an abbreviated course listing for Winter & Spring 2008 quarters:

#### Winter 2008

*RS* 24: Teachings of Jesus in Comparative Perspective (Thomas) Lower division course – 100+ students in lecture with multiple sections RS 137: Gnosticism and Manichaeism (Thomas) Upper division - usually 30-50 students in lecture or seminar format RS 138A: Church, State, and the Construction of Orthodoxy (Taves) Upper division -- 40 students in lecture format *RS* 238: *Seminar in Catholic Studies (Taves)* Doctoral seminar -- six students Spring 2008 *RS* 116A: The New Testament and Early Christianity (Thomas) Upper division -- usually 30-50 students in lecture or seminar format RS 138B: Catholic Practices and Global Cultures (Taves) Upper division -- approx. 30 students in seminar format RS 190WC: Material Catholicisms (Christian) Upper division -- approx. 25 students in seminar format RS 252B: Asceticism and the Construction of Self (Thomas)

Doctoral seminar -- probably 4-10 students RS 292: <u>Visions in Spain and the New World</u> (Christian)

Doctoral seminar -- probably 4-10 students

In addition to the academic courses, the Studies Department offers various Religious lectures and seminars which are often free to the public. This past month, February, an invited speaker, Father Thomas Michel was a guest lecturer in classes and also gave a public lecture titled "At the Convergence of Two Oceans: Issues of Catholic-Muslim Relations." Father Thomas Michel is the, Secretary of the Jesuit Secretariat for Interreligious Dialogue in Rome since 1996 and Ecumenical Secretary for the Federation of Asian Bishops' Conferences since 1994. The lecture. held at Victoria Hall, Santa Barbara, presented developments in Christian-Muslim relations from a Catholic point of view.

So maybe you are like me, not really ready to sign up for Catholic Studies at UCSB. First of all, I already did my stint at the university and secondly I struggle in Fr. Bruce's 1<sup>st</sup> Corinthians Bible Study group. The UCSB Catholic Studies program is not a Catholic catechism or dogma training, nor is it a bible study. The program is intended to look at Catholicism from a historical, secular point of view to help understand how Catholicism has influenced our world and has been influenced and shaped by the world. Fr. Virgil Cordano has been an advocate of better understanding among all peoples; the big picture look at Catholicism that the UCSB program has should help reach that goal.

## discussing the idea that homosexual inclinations can be changed

U.S.- At the same time that news has come out that the Toronto Catholic School board has refused to participate in pro-homosexual activities, homosexual activists are making significant inroads in U.S. schools, as a booklet titled, "Just the Facts about Sexual Orientation and Youth," is set to be distributed to all 16,000 school districts in the country.

The 24-page booklet by the National Education Association and the American Psychological Association, tells students that homosexuality is a "normal expression of human sexuality".

"What's so scary and dogmatic about this report is that it communicates that religious-based viewpoints are harmful, and even dangerous," said Candi Cushman, education analyst for Focus on the Family Action.

The booklet particularly targets the idea that homosexuality is a condition that can be changed. It instructs educators, "Schools should be careful to avoid discussions of transformational ministry in their curriculum." Brian Raum, senior legal counsel for the Alliance Defense Fund, said that the talk of "inclusivity" in schools by homosexual groups is a veiled threat.

"What they're trying to do is create a fear factor here," he said. "There's nothing in the Constitution that would prohibit a teacher from presenting to a student all of the programs that are available, without endorsing or promoting any particular one."

The National Association for Research and Therapy of Homosexuality, (NARTH) says that although "the aim of gay-affirmative counseling programs is humanitarian", the problem is that they do "much more" than discouraging scapegoating.

"In reality, they promote a particular worldview," present students with a set of "truthclaims that students are expected to adopt," and insist on conformity to these.

"These programs promote the value systems of a particular social group and denigrate the views of another, while at the same time, distorting science." URL:

Parish Landscaping-Gardening Crew Produces Colorful Sea of Flowers, Plants By Joe T. Kovach, 3rd Degree Knight

The faithful St. Raphael garden and landscape crew has been going strong for the past 20+ years with a number of parishioners performing exemplary work around the church and rectory.

Led by Suzie Sichi, resident landscape artist and avid gardener, she has had a helping hand from volunteers Larry Torres, George Hopping, Paul Coyne, Matt Mayer, Pia Picotte, Mike and Mirtha Donovan, John Giordano, Andy Zeko, Joe Kovach and Teo and Luis Nungaray, parish staff workers.

Putting their superb efforts together each week, the 'team volunteers' have 148-years of tender and loving care for the many colorful flowers, plants, shrubs dotting the grounds surrounding the church and rectory.

Suzie descriptively elaborated, "Each week is really a gift and a memory.

Seeing the plants go through their cycles with the seasons is so very special - from noticing when the yellow and purple Bearded Iris and Daffodils come back in the spring and the red Amaryllis at Christmas and the California Poppies with their warm orange all summer long, to the Alyssum with its generous carpet of white petals being scraped away when it gets too scruffy to bounce back in a matter of weeks with perky new seedlings. I think that we all are constantly thinking as we work of what might need to be done and all of us give input as to what should be done and when."

Suzie explained, "I was confirmed at St.

Raphael's in 1988 at Easter Vigil after completing RCIA with Msgr. Steve Downes. I had been raised Episcopalian but found myself drawn to Catholicism and had actually attended Mass at St. Raphael's for several years before beginning RCIA.

During those years, I had thought it was a bit sad that there was this great big sunny piece of property around the church but the landscaping consisted of juniper bushes and white gravel with about six roses. As an artist and avid gardener at my home, I saw the possibilities of a garden surrounding the church to really welcome parishioners - a way for them to change channels by contemplating some of God's beautiful gifts to us of color and flowers on their way from the car to the sanctuary. I also saw that Teo and Luis had their hands completely full with keeping up the property as it was."

The full-time teacher at Anacapa School continued, "Right after my Confirmation, I noticed an announcement in the Sunday Bulletin requesting volunteers to help clean up the gardens and so one Saturday I dropped my sons off at the beach and I went off to see what I could do with this group.

Larry Torres was there with a few other men and we swept a lot and trimmed a little and over the next few weeks the place started looking neater. I told Larry about my vision and he bought me some California poppy seeds. That was the beginning, and ever since then I have been working, gradually removing almost all of the junipers and replacing them with flowering plants."

A resident of Santa Barbara since 1967, Suzie recollected, "At the beginning after a year or two of just cleaning and sometimes planting a few border plants, George Hopping got some men to completely tear out the ivy that was in one planter and asked me to figure out what to plant there. I was like a kid in a candy store! I chose yellow flowered ground cover and yellow roses to be complemented in color by purple Mexican Sage and False Heather, the colors of Pope John Paul II and it was so very pretty when it was done."

Her recollection continued, "Then when the parish was going to celebrate its Centennial celebrations, they took out most of the juniper and put in the pretty gathering area patio on the side of St. Joseph's Street. Sam Alfano and George told me to get some plants and there was a certain amount of rush to finish. Unfortunately, I had a problem with my back then but I bought the plants and then my teenage son Cielo and George did all the digging and planting - I really felt like the boss then! But the best part was not right after it was planted but Mother's Day that year because the area had filled in to be this bounty of color, as beautiful as any garden magazine photo you ever saw. After Mass, I noticed that people were drawn to the area, pausing and sitting and just immersing themselves in the wonder of it, just like the vision I had imagined before I converted."

Another of Suzie's vivid reminders, "I think that just how the garden has been so generous in so many ways is something that really stands out for me. When we did the Centennial Garden was the first time that I planted any Shasta Daisies. Ι bought two pony packs, 12 little plants and they have flourished beyond belief, in fact, the hundreds of them we have now are all related to the originals! We move them wherever we want to have bright, white sparkles (the artist Monet was emphatic on the importance of some white in the garden) and they are so hardy and consistently blooming that they have become, after the fantastic roses, probably the signature flower of the gardens. And whenever someone comes by when we are working and says that they like a particular plant, we almost always have been able to give them either the seeds, or a cutting, or dig up a clump for them to take away with them, so in a way the garden boundaries reach way beyond our streets."

Another memory that is very poignant, she added, "Is that after Matt Mayer died on August 30, 2006, his widow Virginia brought us a red rose called 'Love's Desire' which we planted in one of the sunniest spots. We scattered Cosmos seeds all around it (which were one of Matt's favorite flowers) and now it is like he is still making us smile in the garden, even though we don't get to hear his jokes."

Paul Coyne is the rosarian and has been for the past 17-years. He lavishes the TLC of over 75 roses on the church grounds which he prunes once a year and once a month he fertilizes them, gratis. With the gopher problems, he now uses a gopher cage when he plants a new rose. These are circled around the base, a foot down, so that protects the roots.

Suzie's chronological record denotes, "In the early years it was Larry, John, George and me, and of course, Teo and Luis. Larry had to devote more time to his business, then John and George had some health issues. Paul started taking care of the roses and it is all due to his work that the gardens have so many beautiful roses. Matt began to work and Mike as well and then came Pia Picotte, who has been an incredibly hard worker and with a wonderful eye and talent for creating fantastic gardens. Her touches and skills are everywhere in the garden today. When Mike married Mirtha, she happily joined in. Andy and Joe have been doing the middle of the week watering for the past eight years. Also Father Hipp Goossens, C.J., contributed his help while serving as Associate Pastor. Others have helped for a short time and their work was appreciated."

Responding to what kind of work the volunteers do each week, Suzie explained, "We weed, dig, trim, prune, sweep, water, plan and plant. We pick some flowers and arrange the bouquet for the St. Raphael statue in front. We also talk a lot. There is a great camaraderie that has been built over the years, working regularly with people who are so kind and generous and don't mind getting their hands dirty. We rarely need to plant new flowers these days (except in the pots) because we have used mostly perennials and plants that reseed themselves."

Suzie acknowledged, "One other person that I would really like to gratefully remember as inspirational to our success is Msgr. Steve Downes, who was so, so supportive and appreciative of our efforts all of the years he was here. He complimented and thanked us for our efforts any time he saw us and made sure we were acknowledged at the volunteer dinner each year. It's not that we needed thanks - we were never doing it for that - it just really made us feel good to hear how much he enjoyed the beauty that we had been working so hard on each week."

A few interesting bits of information on:

• George Hopping - He brought the red Amaryllis from home to plant by the St. Raphael statue. His wife, Mary reported that George really liked working with Suzie each Saturday. He chuckled, "Trying to keep up with the weeds was a challenge each week."

- Matt Mayer His wife, Virginia pointed out, "Matt would tell me. 'It's Saturday, time to work on the flowers and plant new ones." He did this right to the end - he enjoyed going and working with his 'team.'"
- Mike Donovan One of his hobbies is gardening at his home so he jumped in to help Suzie for the past 12-years. His favorites are pink and white flowers and the wild flowers too. He would like to see more roses planted. He and his wife Mirtha enjoy the bright colors of the many flowers. Mirtha's take on working in the garden, "Nature: one of God's miracles. I enjoy helping Him working at St. Raphael's. Mike added, "It's so peaceful when we are working - no other worries."
- Pia Picotte A native of Lucerne, Switzerland, • she has lived in the area for the past 33 years. Her husband Wes and Pia who were married at Our Lady of Sorrows Church on August 27, 1980, have two sons Sam and Andy. They are in the wind chimes manufacturing business and have their chimes sold in stores and via catalogs mostly in the U.S. and Japan. Pia enjoys working on the parish grounds and loves the people, Suzie has had and the current workers it's like a big happy family. A member of St. Raphael's since 1986, Pia reflected, "It's been a most satisfying experience doing it for the church and meeting so many people. Father Bruce Correio and Noel Fuentes have expressed their happiness to the crew for what they have done and continue to do. Teo has been very cooperative." She added, "The landscaping is very beautiful most of the time but it needs lot of work to make it look so colorful and professionally maintained."
- Suzie Sichi She teaches full time, Italian, Geometry and Studio Art at The Anacapa School, an independent college preparatory school for grades 7 through 12 in downtown Santa Barbara. Suzie and her husband Gordon have lived in Santa Barbara since 1967. They

have two sons, Tom and Cielo and a grandson Meison. Gordon and Suzie love to backpack in the Sierras and travel often to Italy where they lived for one year.

Sam Alfano, Larry Torres and the Knights of Columbus hope to install a sprinkler system in the near future. A good system would certainly be a time saver.

In the early years this garden crew had a staff motto: "You ain't seen nothin' yet!" Yes, they certainly have made it possible to make the church grounds a showpiece of beauty. A few years ago, the Goleta Beautiful Award was given to St. Raphael's for their outstanding professional garden appearance acclaimed Sam Alfano. It was Sam with Jesse Garcia, Roberto Najera and the members of the Parish Gardening Team who also had a dedicatory Centennial Plaque located on a heart Centennial shaped rock in the Garden commemorating 100-years of service by St. Raphael's Church in the Goleta Valley.

Suzie, Pia, Mike and Mirtha will be working only on the first Saturdays of the month starting in March so more volunteers are needed for the other weeks.

#### <u>Knights of Columbus Protocol</u> By Grand Knight Francisco Cabrera

#### **Protocol Part III**

Continuing with more training material for all the members, here is the Part III Protocol published by Brother Don Aubrey in the November, 2004 Knightline.

This is the third and last of the articles on Protocol. Here are a few issues not requiring any lengthy explanation. That does not make them any less important! The Grand Knight should address all members who are not officers as "Brother....." All officers should be addressed by the proper title, e.g. Worthy Chancellor, Worthy Financial Secretary, etc.

When the District Deputy attends a meeting at his own Council he need not be specifically recognized unless he has been invited or requested to be so recognized. This will allow him to engage in the regular business of his home council without involving the position he holds.

The District Deputy should notify the Grand

Knight of a Council in writing and in advance (one week to ten days) when making an official visit so that all officers will be present with their books and records.

The Grand Knight, in keeping with the dignity of his office, should be neatly and properly dressed. He should request his officers to do likewise. Thus he will have set the proper dress code for the membership to follow. (Members are not expected to wear jackets and ties to all meeting but they should be neatly dressed in clean clothes and wearing shoes).

Our nation's flag should be displayed flat, above and behind the speaker. When the flag is displayed horizontally or vertically against the wall, the stars should always be at the observer's left. If the flag is on a staff it should always be at the right side of the speaker as he faces the audience.

All officers should wear their current jewel of office at all council meetings. At council functions and socials, it is proper and fitting that Grand Knights, District Deputies, etc. wear their jewel of office.

I am not addressing the protocol involved in correspondence or invitations to and the seating arrangements for dignitaries for social functions. These are addressed at length in the PROTOCOL handbook published by the Knights of Columbus. The Grand Knight and the Advocate should always have a copy at hand. When you are involved in inviting guest to a social function or planning their seating arrangements, this hand book is absolutely necessary. It is impossible to cite a rule for every Under difficult circumstances not situation. specifically covered by the handbook, simply use good judgment and apply common courtesy, Mark Twain summed up the situation when he said, "Always do right. You will please some people and astonish the rest."


